BIRDERS DELIGHT WITH PETE DUNNE VISIT

The Tallahassee nature community is in for a treat with the visit of Pete Dunne for a series of activities that will highlight his talents. Apalachee Audubon, with sponsorship of Wild Birds Unlimited-TLH, is bringing Dunne to town for a series of events on the weekend of January 22nd. Dunne is Vice President for Natural History Information for the New Jersey Audubon Society, Director of the Cape May Bird Observatory, and the founder of the annual World Series of Birding, which raises thousands of dollars for bird-conservation projects. He is an expert birder, a gifted storyteller, a popular public speaker and one of America's preeminent nature writers. His articles have appeared in most major American birding publications, including Birder's World, Birding, Bird Watcher's Digest, and Wild Bird, as well as in The New York Times since 1987; he is also the author of twelve books including *Pete Dunne's Essential Field Guide Companion* and *Hawks in Flight*.

Dunne writes in the forward of *The Wind Masters: North American Birds of Prey* that "In stories, as in love, as in war, all is fair". With his unique style of storytelling, he will hold you captivated with fascinating facts, playful twists and lingering thoughts that in the end will leave you with a wealth of information and a smile knowing that you've just heard a great story!



JANUARY PROGRAM SPEAKER: ROBERT MONTANARO Critters, Cows, & Cowboys:

A Photographic Exploration into the Wildlife and Work of a Florida Cattle Ranch

Thursday, January 27th, 7:30 p.m. (Social at 7:00 p.m.)



This presentation illustrates the role ranches play in protecting Florida's diverse habitats while chronicling encounters with the many species of wildlife that call Treasure Hammock Ranch home. Additionally, the program reveals what a year of work is like on a Florida cattle ranch—from the stereotypical images of cowboys on horseback herding cattle to the more

realistic hot and dusty workday spent on foot moving cattle individually through the cow pens for vet checkups and myriad other activities.

Bob Montanaro is the administrative assistant for the Pelican Island Audubon Society. "Critters, Cows, & Cowboys" follows on the heels of his previous program, "Ospreys of Pelican Island: An Exploration into the Life of the Fish Hawk", which documents three years of Osprey nesting at Pelican Island National Wildlife Refuge.

FEBRUARY PROGRAM SPEAKER: JACK RUDLOE Operation Noah's Ark

A Rescue Plan for Some of the Gulf's Tiniest Residents Thursday, February 24th, 7:30 p.m. (Social at 7:00 p.m.)



In response to the huge amount of oil that was released into the Gulf by the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill, Gulf Specimen Laboratory's "Operation Noah's Ark" was created and has been working feverishly to preserve clean, healthy seawater and delicate coastal specimens so it will be possible to re-seed the coast should it become necessary.

Jack Rudloe is the founder of Gulf Specimen Marine Laboratory in Panacea, Florida and is the author of seven well-known books on Florida natural history and marine life. He achieved the first live exhibit of the world's largest isopod, the deep-sea giant sea roach and was instrumental in the New York Aquarium's exhibit of the giant Surinam Toadfish, also a first. He has traveled to Malaysia and The People's Republic of China as a representative of the U.S. International Trade Commission to develop fisheries cooperative agreements.

14TH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

The 14th Great Backyard Bird Count will take place **Friday-Monday**, **February 18-21, 2011**. This annual event provides a "winter snapshot" of the birds of the United States and Canada and is free and open to all participants. Count birds on any or all of the four-day event and enter the data online. Despite the title, the counts can be conducted anywhere birds are seen or heard. In 2010 a record 97,300 bird checklists were submitted from all 50 states in the U.S. and across Canada.

During the event, the online data is updated many times a day, and you can keep up with what birds are being reported where (click on "Explore Data"). Check out the Top Ten lists to see what's happening in your location or any other area. In 2010 Florida was in the Top Ten lists for most checklists, most species, and most birds. Tallahassee was #4 nationally in Localities Submitting the Most Checklists and #9 nationally for Most Species. Let's do it again this year!

Another part of the event is the GBBC Photo Contest where you may submit images that you take during the weekend. All photo participants are entered in a drawing for prizes. Local AAS member, Glenda Simmons, received Honorable Mention in February 2010 for her photograph of an Eastern Bluebird in the Composition category.

Go to www.birdcount.org for instructions, previous years' data and to explore, in real time, what is being reported from your own town or anywhere in the United States and Canada. The GBBC is a joint project of the National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology with Canadian partner Bird Studies Canada. It also receives support from Wild Birds Unlimited.

WILDLIFE-FRIENDLY YARDS TOUR, FEBRUARY 19TH: MARK YOUR CALENDAR!

For the fourth year, Apalachee Audubon will host a Backyard Wildlife Tour, showing visitors how five selected homeowners attract birds and other wildlife to their yards. Planners Pam Flynn and Fred Dietrich have found the following people to host visitors on Saturday, February 19th, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.: Mary Huggins and Susan Teisciero, Glenda Simmons, Margaret and Tom Clark, Janeen Langley, and the fifth to be announced soon. Each yard features its own unique habitat and 'specialties' (hummingbirds, bluebirds, etc.).

Beginning February 1st, those wishing to go on the tour may purchase tickets for \$10 apiece at either Native Nurseries or Wild Birds Unlimited. They will receive a map showing the locations of the yards, and a wristband, which indicate that they have paid. At each home Apalachee Audubon volunteers will welcome visitors and provide useful materials about attracting and feeding birds. This year we will also make available information about native plants that attract insects, who in turn attract birds who need insects to feed their young.

RIO GRANDE VALLEY BIRDING FESTIVAL by Bill Phelan

I found my first life bird of the trip (a Bronzed Cowbird) under the rental car at the Harlingen airport. I found two more (stunning views of White-tailed Kites and White-tailed Hawk) within an hour of leaving the airport. And the birding festival would not even start until the next day. If you want to see western birds, south Texas birds, or Mexican birds you have not seen before, and see them in just a few days, try the Rio Grande Valley Birding Festival in Harlingen, Texas.

Every November, the RGV Festival offers guided field trips to the many birding sites of the "World Birding Center" —a coalition of state parks, county and municipal parks, national wildlife refuges, and private ranches that provide habitat for south Texas endemics and Mexican migrants. Birders travel in buses or vans to the birding sites where they divide into smaller groups for bird watching with local and nationally known experts. In the afternoons, there are birding and butterfly workshops and lectures.

The first day of the festival offered a "Big Day" when my group (one of four) found 108 species between 6:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. On the last day, I was in a "Chase Van" where we looked for the most unusual species of the festival—we found the Crimson-collared Grosbeak, the Tropical Parula (both are Mexican birds) and a Fulvous Whistling Duck that had overstayed its Texas visit. In the days between, I saw many South Texas endemics including: Green Jays, Kiskadees, Plain Chachalacas, White-tipped Dove, Red-billed Pigeon, Tropical and Couch's Kingbirds, Redcrowned Parrot, Aplomado Falcon, and Least Grebes.

On the Upper Rio Grande trip, we found all three species of local orioles (Hooded, Altamira and Audubon's) within 10 minutes. We also saw all three species of kingfishers (ringed, belted and green), dozens of Neotropic Cormorants, three Gray Hawks, and many of the above endemics.

Although two prime birding spots, Bentsen SP and Santa Ana NWR, had closed most of their acreage because of recent flooding, Estero Llano Grande SP provided good looks at the kingbirds, Buff-bellied Hummingbird, Ruddy Ground Dove and Vermilion Flycatcher, and many others.

The Festival occurs every year, in mid-November, and is well attended by birders from around the country (one was from Wales, UK). For more info:


